Bountiful Moves Forward by Mayor Joe Johnson

Last month we celebrated, through Handcart Days, our Pioneer Heritage. Next month marks the 161st year since Perrigrine Sessions was asked to establish a settlement to the north of Salt Lake City by Brigham Young. Session's Settlement became Bountiful and Bountiful is now a city of almost 44,000 people, part of a metropolitan area of over 2,000,000 people, and part of a fulfillment of a vision that the desert would "blossom as a rose."

Just as we are proud of our pioneer heritage and our past, we are hoping to establish a vision of the future of Bountiful. During the past several months several citizen committees have been working to update Bountiful's general plans. The City has been busy constructing improvements that will make getting around Bountiful more convenient, including the roundabout at Five Points and the reconstruction of 200 West, as well as major street overlays on Chelsea Drive and 400 East. The City has also updated almost all of the tennis courts in the City with new state-of-the-art courts. The state little league baseball tournament was held at Mueller Park Junior High. We are excited and hopeful that these improvements together with other improvements, that are being made, will result in Bountiful

being better than ever.

The City Council recently approved a city-wide recycling program, which will be begin in December, 2008. For three dollars per month, the citizens of Bountiful can recycle many of the items that were previously simply thrown in the garbage. Twice a month the recycling containers will be picked up by Waste Management, the nation's largest solid waste management company, who will take the materials to a recycling center for processing and reuse. Participation in a city-wide recycling program is the right thing to do, and preserves materials which can be reused or recycled, passing a heritage and legacy of environmental responsibility onto the next generation.



Bountiful City recently entered into an agreement with Centerville City to construct a new, state-of-the-art performing arts facility. This facility will be located in Centerville, just off of Parrish Lane next to Colonial Lumber. When completed, this new facility will allow the performing arts to be taken to new levels. Bountiful and Centerville have been working together to bring this project to fruition.

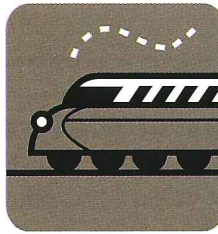

diligently to try to get an extension of light rail into the south part of Davis County. If approved as now envisioned, it would come up Highway 89, go onto 200 West by Willey Ford, go north to 400 North, and continue north on Main Street through Centerville to Farmington. This light rail extension would allow our citizens the abil-



ity to access quick, convenient and timely transportation alternatives throughout the Salt Lake Valley, as light rail and commuter rail expand and blossom. While this project is still several years away, the vision of what we would like to accomplish is clear. Bountiful is a great place to live. We want to keep it that way and we want to make it even better.

Bountiful City's Fall Cleanup

Full cleanup is October 6 thru October 10. During that week city crews on your regular garbage pickup day will also remove trash and refuse which has been properly bundled, bagged or boxed. Limbs and trees must be cut, bundled and tied in 5-foot lengths. Any bundles, bags or boxes must not exceed 50 lbs. Items such as old furniture or appliances should be placed on the drive approach or park strip, not on the street or sidewalk. Please place your items out by 7:00 a.m. on your garbage day.

Also, to assist you in your cleanup, the landfill will not charge a fee to the residents of Bountiful during fall cleanup week or the following week, so trash that does not comply with the above restriction can be disposed of at no charge. We can no longer accept propane tanks or tires of any kind at the landfill.

COMPLIANCE TO THE SPECIAL CLEANUP REGULATIONS IS MANDATORY. TRASH THAT DOES NOT MEET THE ABOVE REGULATIONS NEEDS TO BE TAKEN TO THE LANDFILL BY THE PROPERTY OWNER.

Bountiful City will be conducting a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program on Saturday, Oct. 11, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the City's Maintenance Facility, located at 950 South and 200 West in Bountiful. NEW DIRECTIONS TO BOUNTIFUL LANDFILL

Go west on 500 South, over Legacy Highway and turn right (north) on the frontage road. That road will take you to the landfill.

Garbage is picked up on all holidays except for Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. On those three holidays your garbage will be one day delayed. Again, please have your containers out by 7:00 a.m. on garbage day.

Bountiful's New Roundabout at Five Points

Just in time for the Handcart Days Parade, the barricades were removed from the intersection of Main Street and 1500 South. Construction crews have been working since late April to replace the aging culinary and irrigation mains and to construct the first roundabout in Bountiful.

The new roundabout is intended to solve two problems which were present with the old intersection: First, to reduce driver confusion by standardizing the flow of traffic through the intersection; and second, to increase the efficiency of the intersection by allowing traffic to flow without a mandatory stop.

For drivers approaching the roundabout, three simple guidelines will help you use the roundabout:

First, slow down. Drivers approaching the roundabout should notice the "Circular Intersection Ahead" sign installed in advance of the intersection. This sign indicates an advisory speed of 20 miles per hour, which is the safe speed to be used by cars using the roundabout.

Second, drivers should be prepared to yield. The roundabout has been constructed with pedestrian crossings set



back from the actual intersection. Drivers must yield to pedestrians as they approach the roundabout, and again as they depart the roundabout. In addition to pedestrian traffic, traffic entering the roundabout must yield to those vehicles that are already travelling around the circular roadway.

Third, travel around the roundabout in a counter-clockwise direction, and exit the circular roadway after using your turn signal with a right hand turn.

For pedestrians approaching the intersection, the following guidelines are very important for safe crossing of the intersection:

First, stay on the sidewalk until you reach the marked crossing location.

Second, only use the marked crosswalks. NEVER cross the circulatory roadway to the central island.

Third, watch for vehicles as they enter or leave the roundabout. You may stop in the pedestrian refuge area until it is safe to complete your crossing.

Bountiful Power Update

Bountiful Power wishes to thank those of you who have updated your phone numbers with us. We must have your correct phone numbers listed on your account so we can identify your address in a power outage. If you have not contacted us, please help us update your information so that we can respond faster in a power outage!

When you call us to report a power outage, we will have a real person answer as often as possible. However, with large outages we must use an automated phone system to handle the volume of calls efficiently. This system uses caller ID to match your phone number to your account and address so as to identify your outage location. However, if you call from a phone number that is not listed on your account, the system will not be able to find your address in an outage.

Our phone system can use up to three phone numbers to find your account and address.

We suggest the following:

- Your primary phone number. Generally, this should be the one listed in the phone book.
- Two alternate numbers. You can use cell phone numbers (but notify us when these change!).
- Do NOT use work numbers or any other number that might also be used by an other citizen of Bountiful in an outage.
- Cordless phones do not function during a power outage, so keep one regular phone plugged in - just in case!
