The IRS Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) or the AARP will be offering free tax help at City Hall if you qualify. Volunteers will be at Bountiful City Hall starting Wednesday, February 5 and each Wednesday thereafter through April 9, 2014.

VITA's hours are from 5:30–8:30 p.m. each Wednesday. To make an appointment, find out if you qualify (low to moderate income—\$49,000 or less) or to find other VITA locations, please call 2-1-1. Walk-ins are accepted, but those with appointments will be given preference.

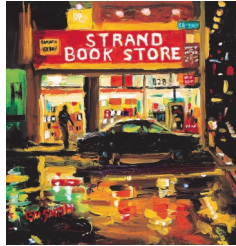

Mayor's Corner: Welcome, New City Council Members!

Mayor Randy Lewis, Councilwoman Kendalyn Harris and Councilman John Pitt took their oaths of office on January 6, 2014, and are excited to begin their four-year terms.

MAYOR RANDY LEWIS

Mayor Lewis and his family have lived in Bountiful for over three decades and as a former long-time small business owner here (BioLabs Medical Laboratory), he is looking forward to getting to know and working with Bountiful City staff and citizens.

Mayor Lewis and his wife, Melanie, raised their six children in Bountiful. They feel the strong sense of community and support here and are happy to now be giving back in this way. Mayor Lewis is a graduate of Granite High School in Salt Lake City, and holds a Bachelor of Science degree in clinical laboratory science from the University of Utah. He is also a member of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

For the last four years, Mayor Lewis has kept, and continues to be busy working for South Davis Community Hospital (SDCH) in the role of Director for Orchard Cove, an orthopaedic rehabilitation facility here in Bountiful. He also serves on the SDCH Board of Directors. His interests include fishing (especially in Alaska), playing golf anywhere and vacationing with his children and 16 grandchildren. Mayor Lewis has served church missions in Australia, Western Samoa (with Melanie and two small children) and recently presided over the Alaska Anchorage Mission. He is a member of the Davis Chamber of Commerce and serves on their Legislative Affairs Committee. Mayor Lewis' vision for Bountiful includes protecting the core values of the City and vigorously supporting Bountiful businesses.

COUNCILWOMAN KENDALYN HARRIS

Kendalyn (Keyes) Harris was raised in Bountiful and is the daughter of Karl and Cozette Keyes. She fondly remembers frosty mugs from Servus Drug and swimming lessons at “the Bubble”. After graduating from Viewmont High, she earned Bachelor's degrees in Political Science and Communications from the University of Utah. That same year she married Bountiful native James.

Kendalyn's political experience includes interning at the Utah State Legislature, President of the Senate in the Utah Intercollegiate Assembly, an appointment by then-Salt Lake City Mayor Deedee Corradini to the Community Development Block Grant Board (1997- 2001), President of the Davis County Republican Women, and State Central Committee member (the governing body for the Utah Republican Party). Professionally, Kendalyn

has worked as a Traffic Reporter and DJ on the radio, Olympics Housing Rental Coordinator, Office Supervisor at the U of U Hospital, News Archivist at Utah News Clips and Finance Chair at the University Student Apartments where she served for two years before she moved with her family back to Bountiful.

Kendalyn founded an award-winning business, “Pirate & Princess Parties,” that serves families all along the Wasatch Front, and her current hobbies include homework, scouts, PTA, piano lessons and soccer games with James and their four children ages 6-13.

Bountiful City's Spring Clean Up

Spring cleanup is April 14–April 18, 2014. During that week city crews on your regular garbage pickup day will also remove trash and refuse which has been properly bundled, bagged or boxed. Limbs and trees must be cut, bundled and tied in five-foot lengths. Each bundle, bag or box must not exceed 50 lbs. Concrete and construction materials will not be picked up curbside. All items including old furniture or appliances must be placed on the drive approach or park strip, not on the street or sidewalk. Please have your clean up items out for pick up by 7:00 a.m. on your garbage day.

COMPLIANCE TO THE SPECIAL CLEANUP REGULATIONS IS MANDATORY. TRASH THAT DOES NOT MEET THE ABOVE REGULATIONS WILL NEED TO BE TAKEN TO THE LANDFILL BY THE PROPERTY OWNER.

Also, to assist you in your spring cleanup, the landfill will not charge a fee to the residents of Bountiful during spring cleanup week or the following week so trash that does not comply with the above restrictions can be disposed of at no charge. Landfill fees will still be in place for concrete and construction materials during the clean up free weeks. We do not accept propane tanks or tires of any kind during the clean up week or at the landfill.

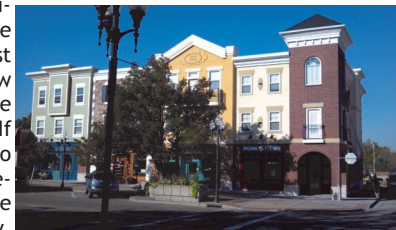


but locking your homes and vehicles when you are not around is still your best protection against becoming a victim of theft.

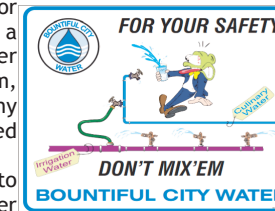

Avoid Cross Connections!

A cross connection is any actual or potential arrangement between a public or consumer culinary water system and any other source or system, that may or potentially introduce any chemicals, fertilizers, or untreated water into the potable water system.

As all of us get ready to install, upgrade, or repair our sprinkler systems this season, please keep in mind to

avoid any form of cross-connection between the public drinking water system and the secondary irrigation system (it's the law!). WATER RESTRICTIONS

We would like to remind our customers that the watering restrictions that prohibit outdoor watering between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. are still and will always be in effect.

Watering during these hours is not very effective, and we need those hours to replenish our reservoir levels when our watering demands increase during the heat of the summer. Thank you in advance for your observance of this ordinance.

Just a Reminder—Winter is Still Here!

WINTER PARKING

"It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, and March." The ordinance also prohibits parking vehicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter, except on Main Street between 400 North and 500 South.

SNOW REMOVAL

Remove snow from the sidewalks adjacent to your property within 24 hours after a snow storm. (City Ord. §6-2-115). Making sure your sidewalks are clear makes it safer for pedestrians and drivers during the winter months. Do not blow or shovel snow off your driveway or sidewalk into the street. (City Ord. §6-2-115). Do not defeat the efforts of our snow plow drivers by putting snow into the street. It is dangerous!
