## Bountiful City Lives Within Its Means

Many citizens have asked how the economic slowdown has affected Bountiful City, and what steps the city is taking to deal with the current economic crisis. These are good questions, and hopefully what follows will be an equally good response.

Bountiful City, like the State of Utah, must adopt a balanced budget. There is no such thing as a "stimulus" package or a "bailout" for state or local governments in our state constitution or state law nor should there be. Each year all governmental entities must adopt a budget that is balanced with regard to revenues and expenses. Thus, if revenues decrease, expenses must likewise decrease. Like the state of Utah, Bountiful does have a contingency, or "rainy day" fund that it can use for exceptional circumstances. However, Bountiful has never used its contingency fund to pay for normal, recurring or ongoing operational and maintenance expenses. This fund has been used during years when we have experienced unusually heavy snowstorms, or had something unanticipated break down or fail that needed immediate repair, but we have not, and have committed to avoid, using one-time monies to pay for ongoing expenses.

Bountiful has also established a "pay-as-you-go" policy—we save up money to pay for needed new construction, repairs, or replacements, and use bonding, or debt, only as a last resort. The result is that Bountiful has no general obligation debt for any public building, utility system, park, golf course, cemetery, landfill, or other public improvement, with the exception of a 40-year debt on its share of the Intermountain Power Project at Delta, Utah. This debt, which began in 1987 and will end in 2027, is being paid

off as part of the monthly electrical bill charged to citizens and businesses. All other electrical power resources in which Bountiful has an ownership interest are fully paid. In spite of Bountiful's lack of debt, our roads, buildings, utility lines, parks, cemetery, landfill, golf course, and other public facilities are in very good shape, and care is taken each year to keep the maintenance current on them.



Bountiful has the lowest property tax rates of any of the twenty largest cities in the state, and the lowest utility rates of any of them as well. Again, our commitment is to keep taxes and fees as low as possible for as long as possible. This commitment will be tested this coming budget year, but we will do everything possible to avoid any sort of increase in either taxes or utility

rates this coming year, thus keeping money in your pocket during these tough economic times. Sales taxes and other revenues have declined somewhat during the past several months, and it is anticipated that with slow car sales, retail sales, and construction activity, this trend will continue for awhile. The mayor and council have committed to living within our means. Likewise, we will keep critical city services operating—including the best snow plowing operation in the state!

The fiscal stress of this economic recession is being felt by our local businesses and citizens as well as our local and state governments. Bountiful City will continue to do its best to ensure that it's conservative approach to spending results in great services, low taxes and utility rates, and properly operated and maintained infrastructure. No bailout requested; no bailout needed.

## Bountiful City's Spring Clean Up

Spring cleanup is April 13 thru April 17. During that week city crews, on your regular garbage pickup day, will also remove trash and refuse which has been properly bundled, bagged or boxed. Limbs and trees must be cut, bundled and tied in 5-foot lengths. Any bundles, bags or boxes must not exceed 50 lbs. Items such as old furniture or appliances should be placed on the drive approach or park strip, not on the street or sidewalk.

### LANDFILL INFORMATION

To assist you in your spring cleanup, the landfill will not charge a fee to the residents of Bountiful during spring cleanup week or the following week, to assist you with disposing of the trash that does not comply with the previously described restrictions.

We are no longer accepting propane tanks or tires of any kind at the landfill.

There are new standards for the disposal of electrical waste, i.e., televisions, computers and the other electrical devices we throw away. Our landfill now has an area set aside to recycle these electrical devices. Please tell the scale house attendant and they will direct you to the area set aside for electrical waste.

## Energy Conservation Tips for Winter

Winter and colder weather are once again upon us and we are starting to use more energy to heat our homes. Here are a few tips to help you keep warm in your home this winter, and save money on energy costs.

- Manage your thermostat and realize that you can lower it a few degrees and still be comfortable. For every 1 degree you lower it, you will save approximately 3% in energy costs.
- Electronic thermostats allow you to set a program and not worry about frequently changing the temperature. Consider purchasing one if you don't have one already.
- Keep your fireplace damper closed when you're not using the fireplace or plug and seal the chimney flue if you don't use it at all.
- Check furnace filters and replace or clean them monthly.
- Don't block your heating vents, radiators, or registers with furniture or other things. That will allow the vent to push the heat into the room more efficiently.
- Drapes can add an extra layer of insulation. Blinds can also insulate, but aren't as effective. Keep drapes and blinds closed at night and open on sunny days to

let in the sun's free heat, especially if the window faces south.

- Caulking and weather-stripping are inexpensive, but very effective in controlling air leaks around windows and doors. Use your damp hand near cracks to detect air leakage. Then caulk or use weather-stripping to seal it off.
- Large holes and cracks can be filled with expanding foam sealant (use easy clean-up types). You can also use flexible foam or other material.
- Check your attic insulation to see if it is at least six inches deep. If it's less or there is none there at all, adding insulation is recommended. A licensed contractor can help.
- If you choose to use heat tapes on your roof, remember to turn them off when you don't need them. Usually an hour or two of use will melt away ice and take care of problems.

## Protecting Our Valuable Water Resources

**M**any, if not most, Bountiful homes, businesses and other properties lie within drinking water source protection zones as established by State regulations. It is the responsibility of all property owners and users to properly manage the use, storage and disposal of chemicals or other substances which could potentially contaminate the ground water which supplies Bountiful's drinking water wells. Examples of



such substances are fertilizers, pesticides, cleaning solvents, and fuels.

### Winter Parking in Bountiful

It's that time of year again when the city's winter parking ordinance goes into effect. In an effort to help our street department continue doing such an excellent job clearing the snow from the roadways, we are asking for your cooperation in not parking your vehicles on the street.



Bountiful City Parking Ordinance 13-1-103 states:

"It is unlawful for any person who owns or has possession, custody, or control of any vehicle to park or allow to be parked any vehicle or trailer on any street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the months of November, December, January, February, and March."

The ordinance also prohibits parking vehicles on the street when it is actually snowing, or within twelve hours thereafter. This prohibition does not include Main Street between 500 South and 400 North.

This ordinance assists the street department in keeping the streets plowed during the winter months. It is difficult for the snowplows to keep the streets free of snow if they have to maneuver around vehicles parked on the street. Bountiful also has many residential streets and cul-de-sacs that are impossible to plow if there are vehicles parked on them.

The police department will enforce this ordinance as we have for the past several years. Officers will be putting warnings on vehicles left parked on the street for the first two weeks of November. After that, officers will begin issuing parking citations on all vehicles that are left on the street in violation of this ordinance. After the same vehicle has been issued two parking citations, that vehicle will be impounded at the owner's expense. This includes all cars, trailers, boats, etc.

The police department does not want to issue parking citations or impound vehicles, but we will do so to assist the street department in keeping the streets clean and safe for our citizens. Please help us by keeping your vehicles parked off the street during the early morning hours.

It is also unlawful to blow, shovel or plow snow from private property onto a public street or right of way causing a hazard to vehicle or pedestrian traffic.
